#### Volunteers Needed! Park Cleanup Day—April 23rd, 9 a.m.

It was a windy winter this year at Salt Springs, and we need your help tidying up the park. Chores include removing hay and plastic from the building foundations, splitting and stacking firewood, walking the trails and picking up and pruning as needed, raking out flowerbeds and lawns, scrubbing picnic tables, cleaning up campsites and digging out fire rings, cleaning out the salt spring, sweeping out the Carriage Barn, and washing off the interpretive signs. This year's list also includes scraping and painting a guardrail.

#### Salt Springs Park Hiking Challenge June 18 & 19

The Endless Mountains Heritage Region (EMHR) and the Friends of Salt Springs Park are teaming up for the first event in the Heritage Region's "Susquehanna County Hikes & Bikes" series: "The Salt Springs Park Challenge," a two-day hike in the park.

To complete this challenge, participants will have two days to reach designated points and take a photograph with their camera or cell phone. They will have the option of hiking alone or with a guided group. The guided hike will cover approximately 8.5 miles on Saturday and 4.5 miles on Sunday. All participants will be given route options and park maps.

Those who will be participating both Saturday and Sunday have the options of staying overnight in the organized group camping area at Salt Springs, going home and coming back the following morning, or reserving overnight accommodations in the area.

The cost is \$20 per participant, which includes the hiking challenge, Saturday evening dinner catered by Uptown Grill, overnight tent camping at Salt Springs, educational programming, and an event Tshirt. Registration is now open: www.emheri tage.org/events.

#### 2021 Annual Report

Dear Friends,

I sincerely appreciate the warm welcome that has been extended to me by the Friends' board, staff, committee members, and volunteers over the past several months. I have been busy learning the inner workings of our organization. I am constantly impressed with the amount of talent around me and the dedication of everyone who keeps our park operating so efficiently. I also want to thank Tom Stoll for the detailed hand-off that he provided for me and for continuing to be available as a resource.

We have a busy year ahead. We continue to work with DCNR on the new footbridge. The Request for Proposals was posted on March 9th and Contractor Proposals are due April 17th. There is a temporary stream crossing in the construction specifications, and we are encouraging DCNR to have the temporary crossing constructed as soon as the Notice to Proceed for construction is posted. This will provide a safe means for our visitors to access trails until the new bridge is completed late fall/early winter. We are also working with DCNR to replace the underground electrical service to the cabin area.

We are financially solvent. The Finance Committee has recommended an annual budget line item of \$10,000 for Capital improvements. Additionally, they have recommended a one-time allowance of \$40,000 for much-needed equipment, park upgrades, and maintenance projects. The Executive Committee met and prioritized these expenses. We will be purchasing grounds maintenance equipment, installing replacement windows in the Wheaton House apartment, installing new gutters, installing rail fencing in front of the Calvin House, performing ongoing maintenance and improvements to trails on Friends-owned land, and many other smaller projects. Also, I am working with Coterra to negotiate a new natural gas lease for Friends-owned land. More details to come. Many thanks to Scott Heckman, our treasurer, and to the entire Finance Committee for their wise use of our investments.

The Environmental Education Committee continues to offer a variety of quality programs. Endless

Mountains Heritage Region is conducting the "Salt Springs Park Challenge" hiking event on June 18th and 19th and it promises to bring many first-time visitors to our park. The Second Annual Taste of the Endless Mountains Beer and Wine Festival will be conducted on August 13th. This promises to be another successful fundraiser

As we enter the summer season, I look forward to seeing you at the park. Thank you so much for your continued support of our organization.


