Trail Day Cleanup, April 23

Volunteers who helped clean up the trails at Salt Springs Park on Saturday brought an enthusiasm that more than made up for the damp, dreary weather.

About 45 people took part in the annual cleanup. Torrential rains in the morning kept some people away but the rain stopped and the wind died down in time for crews to hit the almost 13 miles of trails, moving debris and picking up garbage.

With no pollen, no rain and no hot sun, it was a perfect day to be out, said Lisa and Stan Staros, who brought their three teenagers and a friend from Thompson, Pa. "The kids were really excited to come," Lisa said.

After cleaning their section of the Cliff Trail, the family took a break while daughter Jessica fished for trout in the fast-moving stream.

Tami and Kevin Noonan of Endwell, N.Y., had another section of Cliff Trail, where they bagged some garbage, including part of a plastic chair.

Tami has been coming to the park since about 1985. She and her husband, Kevin, had their second date in the park and were married there in October 2009.

Despite all that history, cleanup day gave her a new perspective. "I got to see a part of the park I'd never seen before," she said.

Longtime park volunteer Ellen Fortunato of Conklin, N.Y., also walked a section of trail that was new to her. With clippers in hand, she nipped scrub starting to encroach on part of the Friends Trail.

Throughout the year, Fortunato works the sides of the brook up to the waterfalls. "I try to get the knotweed out so you can actually see the river," she said.

Among the last families to come off their assigned trail was the Abel family – Sherry, Eric, Erica and Eric Jr. – who came all the way from Honesdale. They've camped at the park, and Eric said the family came for cleanup day because they are committed to spending more time together outdoors this year. Cleaning the popular Hemlock and Woodland trails was clearly muddy work. But Eric had another word for it: "Spiritual."
