Matt's education and experience are well rounded and range from Ecosystem Management to Soil Hydrology and Chemistry Analysis to Mycology. Matt





Trail Heads Now Accessible

Last month we showed you the flooded out access point to three trails, near the Salt Spring — Hemlock, Hardwood, and Upland Trails. During their Community Service Project last month, the Pennsylvania Conservation Corps crew retrieved the wooden footbridge that was washed out in the 2006 flood from an old brush pile, sawed off the rotten parts, and moved the undamaged part to this trail head. Now that's recycling!

NTD is sponsored by the American Hiking Association, in part to make people aware that "Trails do not just appear for our enjoyment; it takes many hours of planning, labor, and negotiating to develop them." The Friends Trail

There are over 12 miles of trails at Salt Springs, from 0.2 to 2.0 miles long,

interconnected. Our newest was laid out and marked last summer — the **Friends Trail**.

Located on the Friends' Land, it is accessed from either the Hardwood Trail, with which it connects, or from the parking lot on Buckley Road. From Hardwood Trail, it meanders south, crosses Buckley Road, and continues through a meadow, into woodlands, along an old logging trail, and through re-growth forest before connecting to Summit Trail.

Adopt a Trail

We invite you to adopt one of the 13 trails that wind through Salt Springs and the Friends' Land. This would involve walking the trail on a regular basis (perhaps once a month), filling out a monitor's sheet, and performing light maintenance such as picking up garbage, clearing limbs and brush from the trail, and trimming back vegetation hanging over the trail.
